## Our Mission

Valor Service Dogs is a 501 (c)(3) taxexempt nonprofit organization that helps post-9/11 wounded veterans and first responders regain their independence, return to civilian life, and maintain successful partnerships through the training and placing of mobility assistance and PTSD service dogs.

Valor Service Dogs also strives to bring awareness and education to the public on service dogs, their training, and the laws that give service dogs and their handlers access and protection.


## What Makes Us Different



Our Founder and Executive Director started Valor Service Dogs because of her husband, a combat wounded veteran with complete and permanent physical disabilities. She understands the real-life challenges facing these wounded veterans and their families and she has an exceptional ability to connect with them, ask the right questions, and pair them with their future service dog. She is unwavering in her commitment to high training standards and she is incredibly selfless when it comes to our veterans, first responders, volunteers, and dogs.

While there are many service dog organizations out there, we are unique in five ways: 1) Our Executive Director was one of the few government-contracted service dog training instructors at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center, bringing best-in-class training techniques to Valor Service Dogs; 2) We are one of the few organizations that focus on mobility AND post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) service dogs, allowing us to help more recipients with a wider range of needs; $\mathbf{3}$ ) We train dogs to meet the needs of a specific person, not a one-size-fits-all approach; each client can know that their dog was specifically selected and trained just for them; 4) We place service dogs in all 50 States, not just within a limited radius of our headquarters; 5) We offer service dogs to First Responders, an underserved population.

## How We Make an Impact

## Train

We use purpose-bred Golden and Labrador Retrievers for our two-year training program. During these two years, our Director of Training leads the service dog through our specially-designed training program with the assistance of a foster family (Puppy Coach) who houses and helps teach commands and socialization. All supplies needed are provided at no cost to the foster family.

Place We have a thorough application and placement process that enables us to ensure that qualified recipients can receive a service dog trained specifically to their unique set of needs. We provide these service dogs at no cost to recipients across all 50 States.

Educate We believe that educating the public on service dogs and the laws that protect them are critical to the ongoing success of our working pairs. We take pride in our public outreach and education efforts.


## Who We Help

We place mobility and PTSD support service dogs with post-9/11 wounded veterans and first responders in all 50 States, at no cost to the recipient. To be eligible to apply:
$\diamond$ Able to travel to Tampa, FL for up to 2 weeks
$\diamond$ Have service-connected physical injury, PTSD, or TBI
$\diamond$ Medical or Honorable discharge/retirement
$\diamond$ Currently engaged with or successfully completed an individual treatment plan with a mental health provider

Valor Service Dogs realizes that there can be unique circumstances and do our best to evaluate each application carefully and thoughtfully.

## Program and Future Outlook

This chart illustrates program growth since our launch in October 2015. Dogs are in our training program between 20-22 months, so puppies added in a certain year are typically scheduled to graduate two years after joining the program.


In 2019, we added 8 new puppies to our training program, giving us a max program size of 16 service dogs in training. This growth was made possible by our donors and volunteers, so thank you!

Graduating 6 dogs was a huge accomplishment for the organization. It made for a very busy year, but well worth it! Expanding our program to include First Responders resulted in something quite exciting - identifying the need for First Responder and Veteran Facility Dogs. There is a need for PTSD service dogs that can work for an entire department, not just an individual. This is a great alternative career path for our very social and loving dogs. These dogs still undergo extensive training, we just tailor their training to serve a group setting rather than one person.

In 2019 we released 2 dogs from the training program. Audie was placed as a First Responder Family Support Dog and Cali was adopted by her Puppy Coach family.

We are incredibly proud of the fact that we've increased the size of our program year over year. However, in 2019, we feel that we exceeded our capacity based on current personnel and structure in place. Moving into 2020, we plan to expand capacity and redistribute some training volume via a satellite program in South Georgia. This satellite training program will be led by Ryan Bodge, Bradley's forever veteran! We will work through the growing pains of this expansion plan in 2020, setting ourselves up for potential growth in the years to come.

# 2019 Financials 




## Expenses

Program Services accounted for $77 \%$ of our total functional expenses, Management and General Expenses accounted for $\mathbf{1 8 \%}$, and Fundraising accounted for 5\%.
Program Service expenses account for all costs related to providing service dogs to our recipients. Management and General expenses and Fundraising represent support services like business management, organizational oversight, finance activities, soliciting contributions, and recordkeeping.

Program Service Expenses include, among smaller categories, service dog in-training expenses of $\$ 50,605$, occupancy of training space totaling $\$ 22,328$, the salaries of program service personnel totaling $\$ 29,044$ and recipient/graduate costs of $\$ 8,750$.

Service Dog In-Training Program Expenses: In 2019, we spent $\$ 6,750$ on the purchase of purpose-bred puppies to join our training program. This amount should have been $\$ 16,000$, but due to the generosity of Project 2 Heal, Warrior Canine Connection, and Hero Labradors, five puppies were donated to our program. Dog food and training treats continue to be the second largest expense category in our service dog expenses, totaling $\$ 13,560$. Total healthcare and veterinary care, both preventative and emergency/illness related, totaled $\$ 12,200$. This amount would have been much higher if it weren't for the generosity of Harmony Vet Care.

## Revenue

In 2019, 79\% of revenue came from individual and corporate gifts, $14 \%$ came from grants, and $6 \%$ came from in-kind gifts. The largest contributors to our revenue in 2019 were a gift from Ken Lamb and Mimi Aye, a grant from The Robert Irvine Foundation, and the sponsorship of a future service dog's training by a patriotic family.
